Access to Housing

A message from Beth Nabors, Executive Director

Over the years, JOURNEYS has become the recognized leader in the efforts to reduce homelessness in our area. We are invested in our shared communities and in the lives of those who come to us in need. We have provided creative interventions and programming typically not offered elsewhere. Because of this experience and history, we know what really works for our local towns and residents and what programs will allow for the largest positive impact as possible.

We work to provide our programs and services in a manner that assures the privacy and dignity that this fragile life situation warrants. Because of this quiet focus, we are often reminded that many members of our community are not aware of the volume and comprehensiveness of the services and programming we provide ~ all for free with the generous support of our donors and partners.

As you may know, there is a big push nationally and locally for affordable supportive housing as a focus to end homelessness. As a result of this government focus and funding, Wheeling, Mount Prospect, Palatine, and now Arlington Heights have approved large scale projects for affordable supportive housing structures in the area that has brought on some controversy as well as some strong support.

Unknown to most, JOURNEYS had been leading this affordable and supportive housing effort for many years but doing so uniquely without governmental funding streams. JOURNEYS has

> provided local permanent and affordable supportive housing for over 10 years by partnering with a real estate holding company. Together, up to 12 people, who were once homeless, can be given housing at any given time for as long as needed.

> Moving forward, JOURNEYS will continue to meet with the community and get their pulse as to what they feel is needed in the area and will work with donors as their charity of choice to do the work they want to see completed in their communities. We will maintain our individualized and unique programs for the most fragile population among us, the homeless and those at risk of becoming homeless, in an effort to break the cycle of poverty.

Solving Difficult Situations



Our suburbs continue to be very expensive places to live in. There isn't enough rental housing for everyone. This drives up the prices of apartments, and to a lesser extent, homes. So, if you make around \$735 a month, which many of our clients do, you'd have to pay about 130% of your income for a one bedroom in this area. In other words,

you couldn't afford an apartment without a lot more income.

Because of the lack of affordable housing, JOURNEYS is so needed. We are masters at coming up with solutions to difficult situations fast. Need to house a family displaced by a fire? We'll contact a bunch of churches and agencies to pay for a hotel, and then move the family back into the apartment, cover rent for a month, and reach out to all of our supporters to replace all the stuff lost in the fire. Need to help a woman and her baby fleeing domestic violence? We'll arrange an interview and transportation with a domestic violence speciality shelter, and fill up their car with gas and clothing for this next stop. Have a client come in barefoot to our day center, hallucinating and with a broken foot? We will clothe them, feed them, shelter them, connect them to a nurse or doctor for medication and crutches, and then provide the long term support to stabilize their health, their income, and their housing.

It's interesting. Almost every time we give tours to people at the HOPE Center, people say, "Wow I can't believe you do so much with so little". Maybe, but maybe what we focus on, which is the potential of people, isn't so little. That's why we have so much success.



PADS Program

Overnight shelter program



Every night two to three sites hosted an average of 77 guests. These guests are grateful to have a warm place to sleep, the comfort of a well-cooked meal and the peace of mind of a safe shelter out of the elements. In April, we had our busiest evening with 102 guests staying in the program.

This summer, as the need for shelter continues to be prevalent in the northwest suburbs, JOURNEYS' chose to expand the PADS program to provide a year round shelter program. During this first summer, three nights of shelter were available each week. The first week of the Summer PADS Pilot Program kicked off by providing 83 guests a warm meal and a safe place to sleep. With the success of the program thus far, JOURNEYS' is looking to expand even more with a goal of providing shelter 365 days a year.

Although there are many ways to measure our success at JOURNEYS, the number of people we get into homes each year is the most tangible.


As of mid July 2017, JOURNEYS has confirmed that we moved the most people into homes last year than ever before.

131 people, each with their own dreams, were moved into permanent housing. This is spectacular! Every single person who has supported our agency should own part of this unparalleled success.

So why did we have so much success this last year? There are many reasons. We worked with clients longer than usual this year, giving us more time to work magic. We had more housing options for clients to move into, because of our staff's relationships with other agencies. Finally, we had the resources to hire more case managers, and once hired, they had the time and skill to focus on getting clients housed.

This last year, it took an average of 6 months of work with clients to make that lasting change. Our clients deserve as much time as needed to get stable. They deserve no less. That is why we have spent so much energy over the last few years building relationships with landlords and other social partner agencies. All of this investment paid off this year. From transitional housing, to permanent supportive housing, to market rate apartments, to ownership of houses or condominiums, to various subsidized options, clients had more choices than ever before.
